A couple of people were so caught up in the joy of the moment that they got out of their



Aren't old car lovers just great??



They have lots of pattern and also some accessories. The only problem is they are copies of authentic patterns and do not have the easy instructions we are used to in today's patterns.

Unless you must have an authentic costume for competition, there are general garment lines that convey the feel of different eras without being slavish to a particular year. For the early part of the century, the easiest way to assemble a costume is a flared full length skirt, cinched waist and a soft blouse.


Ladies, don't be intimidated by those tiny waists. Girls as young as 8 began wearing "training" corsets to get their bodies to grow in the exaggerated form associated with the 19°' century and to prepare them for the real "hardware" of adult life. 'Think

Movie Titanic had some beautiful examples and Simplicity has two patterns of this era. To me these are the prettiest clothes of the century. The late teens showed tunics over an underskirt. and skirts were

beginning to be shorter. From 1920 to 1929 styles changed dramatically. Styles were looser, starting at 5" above the ankles in 1920 to just below the knee by 1929. Movies have given us the idea





knee. Only the rebellious "flapper" was so daring. For the 30's and 40's styles were fitted, in the 30's skirts were longer again and in the 40's shorter. (Makes one dizzy.) Some of the styles were very glamorous. For the 50's a poodle skirt and plain sweater would be appropriate. find floating around in my head. I feel I've kind of rambled but wanted to cover several bases the first time. If I write more. I'll be more specific about different years.







THE LIFE OF "FANNEE"

My father, Frank W. Schmelzer, bought FAN-NEE, a 1950 Plymouth Special Deluxe Model 8P-20. He paid cash for her from G.E. Erickson Used Cars on Columbia Avenue in Kennewick, Washington. She was a six month old demonstrator from Slattard Windle car dealer in Spokane,



Washington who received her on February 20, 1950. The license filing fee at that time was fifty cents.

FANNEE was a dark green, four-door. Dad built a garage especially for her. Her color held up well, and she has never been repainted. He put seat covers on the seats to protect them, and they stayed there until she was sold the winter of 1995. The only dent she ever got was when dad forgot to put her in gear while working at a peach orchard, and she rolled into a tree. The small dent is still in the front left hand fender.

FANNEE got her name from the way she went over a small bridge that crossed the irrigation canal going to Bowles Road. Dad said she looked like a fat lady trying to get into a too tight girdle. One hip at a time! My dad had a great sense of humor. Dad and mom took several long trips in FANNEE. Two trips to southern California to visit mom's two sisters and several trips all over in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. They loved to camp out, and always had a shovel and axe in the trunk. I don't remember ever not seeing a metal can of motor oil wrapped in rags, safely stowed in a bucket in the trunk. Dad was always so careful about car maintenance. We teased him about pulling over to the roadside at 1,000 miles to change the oil. Even after his health failed, he would drive it out of the garage and he and mom would wash her.

After 17 years in the garage gathering dust, we sold her to Jim Mokler. FANNEE was a special car to my dad, and we are so happy that she is so spe-

cial to Jim. I think dad and mom are happy she is in such loving hands.

In 1995, a good friend of mine, Cork Simmelink wanted me to join Ye Olde Car Club. At that time my oldest car was a 1984 El Camino. Cork told me not to worry that an old car would come into my life. At one of our meetings, a few weeks later, Cork told me he had had a call from Sylvia Schmelzer Christensen, a native of our community. Sylvia told Cork that she had her dad's 1950 Plymouth for sale and she would like to see someone locally have the car. Cork told me that we should go and look at the car. After the meeting, we did that.

The car was in a garage that had no lights and the garage door would only open up about half way. Cork and I went into the garage, where the car had been stored for 17 years. The only light that we had was a flashlight. We checked the car over the best we could. Cork said that one thing that was in favor of the car was it only had approximately 60 plus thousand miles and everything seemed original. Well, in the daylight, the car had 90 thousand plus miles, but everything was original.


I bought the car. Now what do I do? I have no way to move it and a mechanic, I am not. At that time, another member of Ye Olde Car Club, Vernal Shreve, told me he had room for the car in his garage and also he would survey the car to see what had to be done after 17 years. After the survey. Vernal had a man working for him that was a Russian immigrant. He name was Feioder. This man is an artist. There seems to be nothing that he can't do. When he was finished, FANNEE was ready to hit the road in as good of shape as it was in 1950.

In the past six years, FANNEE has made several tours and rallies. She has a place in our garage and her own "blanket". Most of all a place in our family. FANNEE is also a member of the Plymouth club and the Cascade Pacific Plymouth Club. You know how FANNEE got her name, but didn't know that the name was part of the condition of the sale that she would retain that name. However, when I applied for the personalized plate for her, Fanny was already taken, so I took the liberty of "respelling" her name. So, if sometime you see a 1950 green Plymouth coming down the road with a Washington license plate with the name of FANNEE on it, you will know who this story is all about.

In closing, I would like to thank the members of Ye Olde Car Club for all of their halo and encouragement. I could never have made it without all of you.
